We are grateful for Ms Carter's support and guidance, which continue to contribute to the ongoing success of our school.




Home readers are being assigned to pupils to engage in reading at their individual levels. Home reading in the Early Years plays a crucial role in a child's school journey and helps to build a strong foundation for literacy skills, language development, and a love for reading. Reading to children at a young age exposes them to a variety of words and concepts, enhancing their vocabulary and comprehension skills. It also promotes bonding between parents and children and stimulates their imagination and creativity.

In Pre-Nursery, children have been listening to and engaging with the story of "The Princess and the Pea," developing their early literacy skills by recognizing story elements and understanding narrative structure. In Nursery and Reception, reading and retelling "Jack and the Beanstalk" has been instrumental in fostering early preferences and writing as they were starting to express their thoughts and ideas through storytelling and simple writing activities. These early experiences are vital in laying the foundation for creating longer pieces and more complex stories in Year 1 and 2, demonstrating the progression of literacy skills as children grow and develop.

On a physical development note, we are thrilled to share that swimming lessons have officially begun in the early years. Our children have embraced this new challenge with enthusiasm and courage, demonstrating themselves to be risk-takers in the water. Their enjoyment and progress are heartwarming to witness. We want to extend our gratitude to all the parents for their patience and unwavering support as we navigate this exciting new chapter together.







We would like to extend our gratitude to all of you who attended the parent information session led by Ms Carter and Ms Stefi. It was wonderful to have the opportunity to share with you the intentions behind our approach and how we celebrate inclusion and diversity in the curriculum. Dear Parents,

I hope that you are well. I have been really impressed by how the Senior School students have progressed over the course of the academic year, culminating in another fine set of assessment grades. There is no doubt that, as a cohort, they set really high expectations for themselves and they are dedicated to their studies, displaying genuine intellectual curiosity. The flip side of this is that, on occasion, their levels of anxiety heighten around the assessment period and they get upset if their do not hit 'perfect' or 'near perfect' scores. The reality is that the purpose of these assessments is to check progress, enabling both students and teachers to get a clearer sense of which areas need to be addressed moving forwards.

We have spoken at length to students about maintaining perspective and using any setbacks as a learning opportunity to improve. Our goal is to develop resilient learners where they recover quickly from difficulties or disappointments, reacting positively and effectively to adversity. As mentioned previously, a key part of a Wellington education is to provide numerous opportunities for students to operate outside their comfort zone so that they can develop greater resilience. Whether this is performing on stage, public speaking, playing a sports competition, or sitting an assessment, the more a student can rehearse mental coping mechanisms for dealing with pressure, the more likely these processes can become instantaneous. Reflection is key to ensure that when students experience setbacks, they focus on what they need to do to improve, rather than focus excessively on the performance outcomes. It would be very helpful indeed if you could speak with your sons and daughters to reinforce this message at home.

On a different note, I am pleased to announce that we will be holding a Film Night for Senior School students on Thursday (21st March) at 7.00pm-9.15pm in the Multi Purpose Hall (MPH) – an initiative put forward by the Student Council. We very much hope that your child is able to attend.



The year 7 students performed an interview as they got into the role of a character from the novel they studied in class- Roald Dahl's 'Charlie and the Chocolate Factory.'






The year 8 students engaged in a Group Discussion on the topic- The Role of Artificial Intelligence in Education.

Sustainability in the EY

"Children have a natural connectedness with nature. Moreover, as children are the decision-makers of the future, the values of sustainable living need to be instilled at an early age through an integrated early years curriculum. Furthermore, through curriculum-based learning experiences and modelling by teachers and parents, children can begin to take the first steps on a lifelong journey of sustainability."

During the first Term of school, the children in Reception and Year 1 embarked on a project focusing on Sustainability. They led their own journey of discovery and learning by asking questions and raising issues that were of interest to them: "How do we recycle in India?", "When all trees are gone, nothing!", "How can we save water?", "Can we help the poor children?"

While investigating the different aspects of the complex Sustainability concept, the children shared their thoughts and ideas with each other, in school and at home. They engaged in debates about different actions ("Is it good to cut trees?"). They used and developed skills such as confidence and independence, collaboration, and questioning. They demonstrated empathy towards each other, people less fortunate than them and our planet. They strengthened their connection with the natural environment and put together a plan of action on how to share all they have learned with others.







Continuing into Term 2, the pupils will delve deeper into the multifaceted concept of Sustainability. They will continue to share their thoughts and ideas, fostering a collaborative environment both within the school and in their homes.

Throughout this project, the children will further develop their skills, including critical thinking, problem-solving, and effective communication. They will be encouraged to question the status quo and think creatively about solutions to environmental challenges.


To deepen their connection with the natural world, the children will engage in hands-on activities, such as gardening, nature walks, and possibly even participating in local conservation projects. 




Parent Information Session – Embracing Diversity and Inclusion: The Journey of a Wellingtonian
